



Over thirty-five years ago a small group of caring individuals had a vision ... to establish a sustainable source of support for much needed services for adults with developmental disabilities. Ahead of their time, these advocates wanted a life for people that was respectful and individualized; where they could have their own apartments, employment, and friends.

Fast forward 35 years and today Project Independence is, in fact, a leading not-for-profit organization dedicated to comprehensive supports for people with developmental disabilities in Orange County. While we are hopeful about the future, we also recognize the challenges we face. 85% of people with developmental disabilities do not have employment. Funding that could go to support people living in the community is often siphoned off to archaic and old fashioned institutions. This report is dedicated to all the people who lived in institutions and came out to celebrate life with their non-disabled peers. For those who endured prison based on IQ in a society that just didn't know better. For people who fought for themselves every day. These are true heroes.

Making a Positive Impact



Sharon has been working at Albertsons for the last 8 years. She works Monday-Thursday for 4 hours each day. PI Accomplishments

Employment Program

Job Developer, Carla Compton, successfully placed 24 people in community businesses in 2013. Our CARF certified employment program now supports a total of 190 people in local businesses.

The iPad Project

Thanks to the grant from California Communications Access Foundation, Project Independence has purchased 57 iPads. Staff are trained to utilize this tool in conjunction with other self-management systems and behavioral supports to enhance employability, increase community integration through normalization, and to foster independence. We will be expanding the utilization of this technology to all staff in the coming year.

Access to Adventure

Despite cuts that eliminated all funding for our Access to Adventure program, this volunteer supported program has provided 730 hours of social and recreational support for 341 people. An amazing 4,379 hours of volunteer time, under the leadership of Kristen Cook, our Director of Human Resources, was provided to keep this much needed resource afloat.

Day Programs

Day program staff supported 50 people in paid employment, along with 152 people doing volunteer work at food banks, libraries, thrift stores, hospitals, and parks all over Orange County.

Collaborations

Collaborating with students at UCI, we developed our comprehensive Healthy Living Program enabling our clients to choose active and nutritious alternatives. Students at UCLA developed a donation maximization and retention research project for us. This helped us expose our programs to a new generation of college students. As we become more and more dependent on fund development, these collaborations become even more beneficial.



A Family's Promise

Stacey Von Berg shared with us the impact that Project Independence has had on her family. Her brother-in-law, Roger, is 64 years old and was born with developmental disabilities. Up until ten years ago his mother was his primary caregiver.

A few years prior his family had tried moving him to an apartment to live independently, but Stacey said the attempt "failed miserably" so he had to move back with his mother. When she could no longer take care of him, the Regional Center helped the family find a group home. This was a difficult transition for Roger.



Later, Project Independence helped him to move into an apartment with a roommate. Staff began to assist Roger with budgeting, grocery shopping, housekeeping, cooking, and doctor appointments. Then about three years ago Roger was able to get a HUD voucher so he could live completely on his own.

Even now, as Roger's capabilities and physical health are declining, Project Independence has stepped up again to help the family manage Roger's needs. Before Roger's mother passed away 8 years ago, Stacey promised her that they would make sure that he was cared for. Stacey shared that our support has taken some of the day-to-day responsibilities off of the family, which allows them to be more productive as well.

Upcoming Projects

Healthy Living

Devote more energy to our comprehensive Healthy Living Program; including recipes, workout routines, incentives for those that make strong and bold choices for health, and collaboration with other organizations. We will also expand our focus on reduction of all waste by reducing, reusing, recycling and educating ourselves on greener living options.

Curriculum Expansion

Expand upon our competency based curriculum for teaching skills; from employment and living skills, to self-advocacy and technology.

State Requirements

Project Independence provides annual updates of services provided, individual performance indicators, and outcomes of each of our programs to OC schools. Transition planning support with the Orange County Department of Education includes tours, meetings, and mock job interviews with exiting students to prepare them for transition to adult services.

Walk for Independence

Make our 2014 Walk for Independence, to be held on September 27th, even bigger and better with a greater focus on sponsorship and team development.

OC Marathon

Project Independence is excited to participate again in the Orange County Marathon, which will be held on May 4th, 2014. Our second biggest fundraiser each year; this event helps us increase awareness of our services within the community and ties into the goals of our Healthy Living Program. Our goal this year is to raise \$15,000 to support our programs.
